



Sounds of South Dorchester Musical Traditions - Live and Very Lively, by Bill Foxwell, 1 June 2011

By popular demand, the South Dorchester Folk Museum program presents an **encore performance** of their very well received November 2009 concert.

In this encore performance Bill Foxwell and Friends tells a little of the history of the local musicians and plays and sings some of the old traditional songs. This is the music that was played years ago by the different musical groups of South Dorchester.. ..and it is still played today. These musicians were watermen, boat builders, farmers, carpenters and etc., 99% of them were self-taught and could not read music. They played by ear. In other words, they played it like they heard it, the same way we do today. Some of the groups were:

- **Madison:** *The Mills Brothers*: Raymond, Alfred & Henry Mills
- **Neck District:** *The Log Cabin Boys*: William Marshall, Roy Ruark, Neal Ruark, Curtis Warfield, Ed McGrath & Melvin Condon
- **Church Creek:** *The Newcomb Family*: Medford Newcomb, John Newcomb, Mildred Newcomb, & Bill Murphy (There were 9 children and all could sing and play)
- **Andrews:** *Rhythm Rangers*: George Andrews, Buddy Mowbray, Charles Blades, Darcy Harding, Alva Lee Henry, & Bruce Dean

Some of the musicians would make their instruments or they would buy one from Sears Roebuck or the Dixie Bargain Store in Cambridge. They sent to music publishers and bought song books, so they could learn the music. They also purchased song books from Dixie Bargain. And on Saturday night, they listened to the Grand Old Opera on the old battery operated radio. This is how they learned a lot of the songs, which were mostly country, blue grass and gospel. They played at the old country stores, barn dances, school programs, in churches and gathered to play music in each other's home. Many of them played on the local radio station in Cambridge on Saturday mornings.
